2014 was a busy year for Sustainable Kingston. Key events included the Sustainable Kingston Forum where Board members Sarah Whalen and Jennifer Kiwala took major leadership roles in this highly successful event held at St. Lawrence College--an event which brought in more than 1000 enthusiastic Kingstonians and showcased many of our community partners and their contributions in helping our community become more sustainable. Another highlight was the Green Buildings Symposium, held in May, which showcased Kingston's initiatives in sustainable building design and hosted many expert speakers in this field.

In 2014, Kingston was chosen as one of three communities in Ontario to pilot the Sustainability CoLab initiative.

With funding from the Ontario Trillium Foundation, the non-profit Sustainability CoLab initiative aims to create a provincial network of communities to work with business and industry to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Locally, Sustainable Kingston will lead the CoLab initiative to support community-driven and action-oriented approaches to business sustainability.
