MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR

Like you, the team at Sustainable Kingston is concerned about the impact that climate change is having on the habitability our planet. Right here in Kingston, we have already begun to see the effects. Kingston is known for its location and beautiful views of Lake Ontario, but rising temperatures and heavier rainfall are contributing to the growth of toxic algae and bacteria that impair the quality of our water. We are seeing an increase in the frequency and intensity of storms, such as the one that hit Ottawa last year, and rising water levels that have flooded communities along the St. Lawrence River.

Despite these concerning trends, a growing number of governments, both domestically and abroad, have refused to take meaningful action to fight climate change, and in some cases, have implemented policies to dismantle the legislative and policy tools that were previously available. It has become clear that we will not be able rely on our politicians alone to solve this problem.

It is now more important than ever to stand together as leaders in the community and make firm commitments to change our own habits in order to reduce greenhouse gasses. While it is easy for us to blame our politicians for mishandling the climate file, we must also turn the spotlight back on ourselves. We need to stop assuming that the government or the technology industry will find the solution for us. This is our problem to solve.

Our team at Sustainable Kingston has had a very successful year. We have worked hard to make meaningful contributions in our role as stewards of the environment and proponents of a more sustainable and livable community. Some of our recent achievements include:

Launching Sustaina Leco, a new web-based platform designed to recognize and celebrate the businesses in our community who have embraced sustainable practices, such as reducing their carbon footprint, practicing food recovery, paying a living wage, and many more;

Hosting the second annual Kingston Climate Change Symposium attended by more than 350 people who shared their experiences and heard from leaders who are taking steps to respond to the global crisis;

Coordinating a community wide clean-up with Pitch-in-Kingston, where more than 5300 members of our community worked to restore the beauty of our natural landscape;

Expanded our Green Economy Program to Belleville and Brockville so we can work with new communities to build upon the green house gas reductions we have helped to facilitate here in Kingston.

We look forward to continuing to work with the leaders in our community to help inspire and achieve, local, meaningful change as we work to ensuring a more sustainable future.




